## MESSAGE ARTICLE – MAY 2020 Rabbi Shae J. Kane D.D.

Just in case you needed a respite from all the covid-19 craziness we are currently dealing with, it is important that we focus on something that needs our attention i.e. the completion of our 2020 census forms. My article this month deals with why the Torah requires the newly freed Children of Israel to take a census of the mixed multitude of their masses. Hope you enjoy the respite and the change of pace. Since the 2<sup>nd</sup> night of *Pesah*, we have been counting the days of the *Omer* and just before we celebrate the Festival of *Shavuot*, we finish that counting. It is no accident that every year, before the Festival of *Shavuot*, we read *Parsahat B'midb*ar - with its counting of the census of the Children of Israel who were freed from slavery in Egypt. *Hashem* commands *Moshe* to "take a head count of the entire community of the Children of Israel [Numbers 1:2] According to the *Torah*, the number of people that were counted was 603,550 [Numbers 1:46]. Having left Egypt, crossed the sea, encamped in the wilderness, received the Torah at Mount Sinai, and built the tabernacle, Israel was now ready to begin their journey home. But before they could embark on this journey it was important to count the nation for military and demographic reasons. It was a little like leaving on a bus trip with a group of kids. Before you leave, you have the participants count off so that you know how many people should be present at each stop along the way.

603,550: That's a whole lot of people! But, in fact, the number was even larger. That only accounts for the males over 20 years of age who were fit to become a fighting force. If you are planning a conquest, it is important to know how many people can serve in the military. 603,550 does not take into account women and children. All told, there had to be at

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least two million Israelites in the wilderness if we take the Torah at its word. That is a lot of people to feed when you are in the middle of nowhere, even if God does provide three meals daily. As a result, Bible scholars have arqued that this figure cannot be correct or at the very least, that it is imprecise. Some argue that the Hebrew word eleph derived from - aleph the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet - must have another meaning. They suggest that it doesn't mean 'a thousand' but is a military term for a unit of five or six soldiers; in other words, there weren't six hundred thousand Israelites of drafting age, but six hundred units of Israelites of drafting age. But these numbers become even more mysterious when we explore their significance. According to the *Zohar*, a thirteenth century mystical work, the six hundred thousand Israelites of drafting age correspond to the letters in the Torah. This was also the number of people who stood at Mount Sinai when the people of Israel received the Torah. So, the Israelites not only received the Torah – each person had a letter in the Torah. Since, according to tradition, we were all present at Mount Sinai each of us must have a letter in the Torah as well. This is a powerful idea – the idea that each of us has our own special letter in the Torah. Some mystics also claim that the name Yisrael is an acronym for Yesh Shishim Ribo Otiot LaTorah, "There are six hundred thousand letters in the Torah!"

There is only one problem with this: It is not true! In reality, there are only 304,805 letters in the Torah. We must wonder: How could the author of the *Zohar* get it so wrong? How is it that later scholars were not troubled by the difference between the number of letters they claimed the *Torah* contains and the number it actually has? There can be no question that they knew exactly how many letters there were in the Torah. Long before computers, our ancestors were busy counting chapters, words and even letters. They missed nothing in their analysis of the *Torah*. And even if we take into account <u>haser</u> and <u>malei</u>, shortened and full spellings of Hebrew words, surely, they knew that the *Torah* would have to be twice as long for it to have 600,000 letters. So, what were they getting at?

The sages never expected us to literally take them at their word when they said that there were six hundred thousand letters in the *Torah*. The truth is they were not that interested in counting the letters. They were trying to say that when it comes to Torah every Jew counts. By itself, the *Torah* is just a scroll. Unread, it does not matter how many letters or words it contains, or what lessons it can teach us. It only becomes a living and dynamic document when we add ourselves to the equation, when we become part of the *Torah*.

That is why the expression that is used to describe the counting of the Israelites in today's parshah is *si'u et rosh*, literally "lift up the heads." But

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maybe it is something more: to lift the head is a way of saying, confer dignity and meaning on each person. Every Jew is part of the *Torah* just as every letter is essential to the *Torah*. This is the goal of every congregation: to lift up its members. To make them feel that they are part of this ancient scheme of things and part our grand tradition. The *Torah* does not have meaning without the people of Israel, and the Jewish people cannot exist without the *Torah*. Each of us is the missing link in the Torah; we transform theory into reality, and lessons into living. So, play with the letters all you want and count them backwards and forwards. Just remember: the *Torah* is a living document.

The Zohar says: "God, Torah, and Israel are one." These are the three legs of a stool. If you remove any one of its legs, the stool will topple over. It does not matter how you read it or with whom you read. What counts is how you read yourself into it. Judaism is defined not by these three elements separately but by the dynamic interaction between them. As we prepare for Shavuot, at the end of the month of May, we ought to take the time not only to count the letters of the Torah but to count ourselves into the Torah as well. How do you translate and interpret your word of Torah? How can you give it meaning? And how will you use it to celebrate and rejoice in our heritage?

We are physically separated from each other, which is akin to losing a leg of the stool, but we are not toppling over because we have faith that we will endure.

## A Special Request

Yes, Passover has ended for this year. An especially trying time, and even more making the special dishes we all enjoy. Some of us are not the master chefs that many of us are. No gifts cards will be sent to us unless we send them a check first.











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
