#### Rabbi's Message November 2025

Upon creating the first human beings, God guided them around the Garden of Eden, saying "Look at my creations! See how beautiful and perfect they are! I created everything for you. Make sure you don't ruin or destroy MY world. If you do, there will be no one to fix it. (Midrash Koheleth Rabah 7:13)

I just read that President Donald Trump just allowed permission for leases to be bid on for the ability to drill for and extract oil and mineral resources from the Alaska Arctic Wildlife Refuge. This is an area that in a word has been described as 'pristine.' Leaders in Indigenous Gwich'in communities near the refuge consider the coastal plain sacred, noting its importance to a caribou herd they rely upon, and they oppose drilling there. Leaders of Kaktovik, an Iñupiaq community within the refuge, support drilling and consider responsible oil development to be key to their region's economic well-being.

This message is not about the debate over whether to drill in one of the nation's environmental jewels. It is about something else.

The Torah states that at the end of the 6<sup>th</sup> day of creation;

וַיַּרָא אֱלֹהִים אֶת־כָּל־אֲשֶׁר עָשָׂה וְהַנֵּה־טָוֹב מְאָד

And God saw everything that he had made, and, behold, it was very good...(Braysheet 1'31).

The Torah seems to suggest that God was satisfied with everything that was created, as it states, "it was good." Therefore, I must conclude that the created landscape, mountains, hills, valleys, beaches, streams, brooks, rivers, lakes, and oceans were perfect in its initial condition.

Furthermore, the Torah includes rules on caring for the earth through principles like stewardship, שַּלְּהַ bal tashchit (do not destroy), and the requirement to give the land a rest. These principles are rooted in the belief that God created the world, and humans have a responsibility to care for it, preserve its resources, and ensure a sustainable future for generations to come.

Man was given authority over the earth, but this is about responsibility to care for it rather than exploit it. The Torah described this as tending the "garden of Eden" to both work it and protect it.

וַיַּקֶח יְהֹוָה אֱלֹהָים אָת־הָאָדֶם וַיַּנְּחֲהוּ בְגַן־עֵּׁדֶן לְעָבְדָה וּלְשָׁמְרָה:

And the Lord God took the man and put him into the garden of Eden to cultivate it and to guard it. (Brayshheet 2 '15)

The root Hebrew of וּלְשְׁמְרֶה (and to keep it) also means 'to watch it,' protect it, keep it safe. Therefore, the principle of בל משהת <u>Bal Tashchit</u> (Do Not Destroy) exists. This principle forbids the needless destruction or waste of anything useful.

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A key example is the prohibition against cutting down fruit trees in a besieged city

When you shall besiege a city for a long time, in making war against it to take it, you shall not destroy its trees by forcing an ax against them; for you may eat of them, and you shall not cut them down. For is the tree of the field a man that it should besieged by you? Only the trees which you know are not trees for food, you shall destroy and cut them down; and you shall build siege works against the city that makes war with you, until it is subdued. (Deuteronomy 20'19,20) This concept has been extended by rabbinic tradition to prohibit any wasteful act that damages the environment.

In the past three years, I have spent an inordinate amount of time in Switzerland, which as irony has it, is where I am writing this message. Switzerland is a country of great natural beauty, where I have come to learn, appreciate and understand a glimpse of what I believe creation meant.

Albert Einstein wrote "Switzerland's landscape seems to have been created not just for us to enjoy, but to remind us of the sublime beauty and harmony that can exist in the world."

I have traveled extensively around the world and seen amazing and beautiful vistas, bewildering and stunning views, sunsets and sunrises, rainbows, and cloud patterns. When in my Pennsylvania home, the language of the birds in the early Spring and Summer morning introduces the new day, awakening the slumbering to life. I love to wake up with the dawn. It is creation unfolding all around you, not something that you will find in Brooklyn or any metropolis.

The Swiss are generally conservative in their thinking and actions and therefore extremely vigilant about their natural and beautiful landscapes. To build or even repair a building is a long drawn-out process for approval. Anything that can cause problems with infrastructure or diminish the natural resources will be rejected. Secondly, recycling is mandatory and waste is disposed of very clinically. The fines for ignoring these rules are hefty. It is if the Swiss are trying to protect what they deem as perfect, as they found it, as God created it. In recent years, many nations have started paying attention to Global Warming but not so much to the land issues. Other countries, like Norway, Canada and Ireland have started paying attention to their ecology and natural resources and have implemented similar rules and regulations. The larger industrial countries ignore these warnings and continue to destroy the world infrastructure.

The sad truth is that many have never learned or been taught this, ignore or didn't care about the gifts and blessings that earth provides us. They continually abuse it, degrade it, pollute it and in many ways have damaged large parts of it. When efforts are made by those to observe these biblical instructions, they are scorned, ridiculed, and ignored. Uncaring, unsympathetic, and selfish people ignore the science and the warnings in pursuit of greed, selfishness, and self-esteem. In our country, the current administration has basically gutted the EPA, the Environmental Protection Agency, removing protections for businesses that pollute and disregard health and well-being for a larger profit margin. The Torah is very clear that we have a responsibility to care for his creation. As mankind continues to head down this destructive road slowly and maybe deliberately, the efforts by the Swiss in caring for the land, are slowly becoming a blueprint for other nations and those who visit, to see the positives about caring for your land and resources.

Judaism demands this of us, and we need to act accordingly before it is too late and there will be no one to fix it.
